P.E.O. is not the same organization that my grandmother joined. It is big business maintaining and collecting millions of dollars, helping thousands of women with their education – also using all manner of modern electronics. “Good friends (P.E.O. sisters) are like stars, you may not always see them, but you know they are always there.” “Choosing to become an O&A woman” (by Karen Martin Blair, CA president – presented at 2004 Presidents and Organizers Conference) – “I don’t know of any woman I would choose to be around more than a P.E.O. who is also a practicing O&A (Object and Aims) woman. I’m not sure if you caught that or not, because while all of us are P.E.O.s, becoming an O&A woman is a choice we make. An O&A woman chooses to make her difference, wherever she is and in whatever she does. Simply paying your dues each year will keep you an active P.E.O. But living as an O&A woman requires choosing to be called to something higher, choosing to live out the meaning of our letters, choosing to be a different woman than you would naturally be.” AL P.E.O.s are O&A women.
